WESTERN LEE SEWER PROJECT RIGHTS-OF-ENTRY ASSISTANCE

Mr. Poe presented the Board with a proposed Memorandum of Agreement with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for assistance in obtaining rights-of-entry for the Western Lee Sewer Project. Due to the COE providing considerable funding for this project, the County is required to follow all the regulations and guidelines associated with that funding. The Corps of Engineer's requirements are more stringent and will require shovel test soil samples at multiple locations through the project area, and right-of-entry agreements will be needed for nearly 500 property parcels prior to final design of the proposed system. Since the County has limited staff, we are requesting the Corps of Engineers assist with this task. The Memorandum of Agreement specifies the terms under which they will do and states an anticipated labor cost by the Corps of Engineers of \$41,500.00, which the local sponsor, the County, would be required to pay.

We are relying on funding from the LENOWISCO Planning District Commission, but if they are unable to do so, the County will be responsible for these costs.

SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

Mr. Poe reported that the Solid Waste Committee met again on December 3, 2019 to further discuss issues related to solid waste, recycling and litter enforcement. The committee makes the following recommendations for consideration by the Board of Supervisors.

- 1. Reduce Solid Waste Convenience Center hours during the months of November through March to 7:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m. This recommendation is made for employee security.
- 2. Close all Solid Waste Convenience Center sites on Sunday. This will reduce weekend scavenging, potentially eliminating the need for running a truck on Saturday, and allowing sites to be operated an additional 1 3 hours during the week.

- 3. Close the Solid Waste Transfer Station on weekends except for the 2nd Saturday of each month and open every Saturday in April and October. This will allow full staffing on all weekdays. The current volume of waste tipped on Saturdays is very minimal.
- 4. Eliminate the recycling program in its entirety. The plastics market has completely gone away and the price of paper and cardboard is down considerably. Since eliminating plastic from the recycling program, receipt of other recyclables (newspapers, mixed paper, and cardboard) has decreased by 60% or more and is no longer economically feasible to maintain an employee and equipment for the reduced quantity.
- 5. The Turners Tipple and Olinger roadside sites will be replaced by new fenced facilities leaving only Hurricane Bridge and Hunters Gap as the remaining unfenced sites. The Committee recommends that a public meeting be schedules in January to accept comments on the closing of these sites entirely, or the possibility of consolidating them into one fenced location.

It was moved by Mr. Mosley, seconded by Mr. Slemp, to approve all five of the recommendations made by the Solid Waste Committee. Upon the question being put the vote was as follows.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF LEGISLATION TO IMPROVE THE PROCESS FOR REVIEW OF LEGISLATION WITH LOCAL FISCAL IMPACT 19-022

WHEREAS, each year the General Assembly considers thousands of pieces of legislation, many of which have a significant impact on local governments; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of the need for localities to have an opportunity to review and analyze legislation that may require additional expenditures of local funds or reduce local revenues, Virginia Code sets out a process for the Commission on Local Government to develop local fiscal impact statements for such bills, with the assistance of local volunteers; and

WHEREAS, under the current process, the large volume of bills and the rapid pace of the legislative session limit the time that is available for the review of bills with implications for local government finances; and

WHEREAS, the local volunteers who assist with the fiscal impact review process take on this responsibility in addition to their regular duties, often during the same time as local budgets are being finalized; and

WHEREAS, prior to 2010, legislation that had a local fiscal impact was required to be introduced by the first day of the General Assembly session, which allowed some additional time for the legislation to be reviewed by the Commission on Local Government and local staff, but this requirement was eliminated in the 2010 session, compressing the opportunity for review of legislation in subsequent General Assembly sessions; and

WHEREAS, additional time to review legislation would allow for a more thorough understanding of the potential ramifications of bills affecting local finances; and


WHEREAS, a robust analysis of legislation affecting local governments benefits policymakers, as localities work in partnership with the state to deliver critical services to Virginia residents;

RESOLUTION PROMOTING THE ORDER OF MILITIA WITHIN LEE COUNTY, VIRGINIA, PURSUANT TO THE SECOND AMENDMENT OF THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION AND THE CONSTITUTION OF VIRGINIA 19-021

- **WHEREAS,** the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution (Second Amendment) reads: "A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed"; and
- **WHEREAS,** Article 1, Section 13, of the Constitution of Virginia reads "A well-regulated militia, comprised of the body of the people, trained to arms, is the proper, natural, and safe defense of a free state, therefore, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed... and that in all cases the military should be under strict subordination to, and governed by, the civil power"; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Second Amendment reserves the right to regulate arms to the states, as militias are local and not federal forces; and
- **WHEREAS,** Article I, Section 13 of the Constitution of Virginia is substantively equal to the Second Amendment, wherein the right to regulate arms is placed upon the locality that orders the militia;
- **WHEREAS**, to commit to the fullness of the Constitutional freedoms granted by the Second Amendment and Article I, Section 13 of the Constitution of Virginia, the Lee County Board of Supervisors finds the following measures as appropriate and necessary to well order its militia; and
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Lee County Board of Supervisors hereby expresses its intent to vigorously uphold the Second Amendment rights of the law-abiding citizens of Lee County, Virginia;
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that,** in order to enable the well regulated militia under the Second Amendment and Article I, Section 13 of the Constitution of Virginia, this Board hereby expresses its intent to adopt the following measures at subsequent dates and times:
 - (1) Provisions to fund concealed weapons training for Lee County residents, including firearms safety training in Lee County Public Schools;
 - (2) Provisions to fund Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC), Boy Scouts of America, and Girl Scouts of America programs;
 - (3) Provisions to eliminate funding for any enforcement of any laws or regulations which would unconstitutionally infringe upon rights of Lee County's law-abiding citizens to keep and bear arms, in accordance with the full breadth of the Second Amendment and Article I, Section 13 of the Constitution of Virginia; and
 - (4) Other such future provisions as the Board may deem necessary or appropriate for the purposes stated above.
 - **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Lee County Board of Supervisors hereby declares its intent to oppose unconstitutional restrictions on the Second
